Women in the Skilled Trades - Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW)

On Saturday 22 February, I attended virtually an excellent talk on Women in the Skilled Trades. CFUW provides scholarships for women in the skilled trades. Kathy Wosnick, CFUW Advocacy Chair, moderated the panel. Speakers were Stephanie Allen, Joni Jean and Dr. Amin Yazdani.

Stephanie Allen is the Program Manager of Skilled Trades at Women's Enterprise Skills Training (WEST) of Windsor, bringing 14 years of experience in program management, employment counseling and job development. Her work focuses on empowering women and newcomers to achieve their employment goals through education, training and tailored support. Programs deal with overcoming barriers for women, language training and finding sustainable work. WEST partners with St. Clair College for a preapprenticeship program. WEST is conducting a research project funded by the Ministry of Training and Colleges and also receives funding from the Ministry of Labour and

Skilled Trades Program. Stephanie finds that a lot of women have experienced GBV and provides training to address this problem with psychologists and speakers who address GBV and mental wellness. The program also builds confidence and financial literacy. #WhyNotHer. In addition, employers have to take a six-hour training before being accepted as an employer of a safe and inclusive workplace for women. Lots of acronyms: SMART for Women program federally funded; UNIFOR Canada when they host an entire week. wearetrades.ca



Joni Jean is an Academic Chair at Conestoga College in the Schools of Engineering & Technology and Trades & Apprenticeship. Joni manages the precision machining, woodworking and aviation programs, and is the lead for the college's Engineering, Technology and Trades for Women (ETT4W) initiatives such as CAGIS Canadian Association of Girls in Skilled Trades, JILL of all Trades events such as a day for women, WIST Women in Skilled Trades, ConnectHER which is a partnership with Fanshawe Corporate Training. Connect HER is holding a parallel event at NGO CSW69 in NY.

Dr. Amin Yazdani is the founder and executive director of the <u>Canadian Institute for Safety, Wellness & Performance</u> (CISWP) at Conestoga College. His research focuses on developing innovative solutions to prevent workplace injuries and improve job accessibility for a diverse workforce. He employs an integrative approach that enhances the scientific understanding of injury risks in order to generate practical, evidence-based solutions to improve workplace safety, performance and productivity. We learned that women experience the majority of workplace injuries. These high levels are related to tools, machinery, etc. made for men that do not account for women's physical characteristics. He takes a psychophysical approach to technologies to reduce physical impact. WSIB funds the MOSAIC project.



As a new U.S. administration issues repeated threats to impose punishing tariffs on Canadian exports, the IRPP hosted a panel discussion on how to address the intersecting affordability and climate crises.

Zonta Says NOW to Gender-Equal Climate Action is a movement to focus on climate justice at international, national and local levels. The webinar

A request to know [candidate name]'s position on GBV and IPV

The newly-formed Zonta Club of Kanata-Stittsville is writing to confirm your views and your party's policies toward gender-based violence (GBV) and intimate-partner violence (IPV).

Our club is a member of Zonta International (https://zonta.org) a world-wide human-rights organization striving to build a better world for women and girls. I am attaching press coverage of the celebration of our club's inauguration late last year. We are mainly centred in the western part of Ottawa but our members do include those from Brockville.

We strongly support the position taken by the Toronto YWCA in regard to the upcoming provincial election laid out in their campaign Vote to End Gender Based Violence reproduced below: https://www.ywcatoronto.org/takeaction/campaigns/vote-to-end-gender-based-violence

This election, let's urge all political candidates to:

- Declare intimate partner violence an epidemic to acknowledge the public health and safety crisis.
- Establish an independent accountability mechanism to advance community-led long-term planning efforts to address and eradicate gender-based violence and to ensure leadership and accountability across parties and election cycles.
- Fund and sustain the solutions required to respond to and prevent gender-based violence.

We further support an open letter sent by the YWCA to the provincial government in December 2024, Open Letter from 150 Organizations Urging Ontario Legislature to Pass Bill 173, The Intimate Partner Violence Epidemic Act, 2024.

We wish to confirm that you support: efforts to reduce GBV and IPV, protect vulnerable populations, and decrease the calamitous consequences of GBV and IPV on women and families.

We also draw attention to the fact that, in view of recent shocking international developments, specifically the United States' aggressive move to level tariffs on Canadian exports to America, this issue is even more urgent. We know that tariffs will result in economic turbulence. Historically there is a strong and disturbing correlation between economic downturns and increases in domestic and gender-based violence. Consequently, with the benefit of foresight, we ask what additional early measures your party will introduce to avoid catastrophic consequences to the greatest extent possible for women, their families and vulnerable populations?

"We are unique in some aspects because district 2 is located on both sides of the border," Abess said.

Despite the lines on the map, Abess said "our commonality is strong."

"You can add your voice and we can all stand up for equality. We advocate and make change to the status of women meaningful change."

The club's first president is Judith Ainsworth, the vice-president is Camelia Dubic, the secretary-treasurer is Kathleen Smith, and the director is Kelly Laidlaw.

Abess said the new club is already displaying a healthy cross-section of the community. She said she was surprised at the number of

men in attendance, even if only two are members of the club so far.

"We cannot expect the change we need without men joining us," she said.

Ainsworth said local Zonta members are already involved with Ottawa's Alliance to End Homelessness and ending child marriage in Canada, where the legal age to marry is currently 16. The Kanata-Stittsville club has begun a petition to raise that age.

The local club will also work on 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-based Violence, which begins on Nov. 25. February brings Human Trafficking Awareness Day, and there will also be local Zonta activities to boost climate action on Earth Day.

Ottawa Couns. Cathy Curry and Glen Gower

both welcomed Zonta's new local club. Gower thanked members for volunteering.

"The healthiest neighbourhoods are the ones where people get involved," he said.

Surprise! Elspeth received replies!

Rob Rainer: I fully support "efforts to reduce GBV and IPV, protect vulnerable populations, and decrease the calamitous consequences of GBV and IPV on women and families." Fyi I am a cofounder and was the first Chair of the <u>Lanark Basic Income Network</u>. On April 24 Lanark Basic

Income Network (LBIN) hosts an event on IPV and basic income, at the Carleton Place Town Hall Auditorium and to feature Senator Kim Pate and Lanark County Interval House Executive Director Erin Lee. See the LBIN website for more information about this free event. Good luck with your ongoing efforts to raise awareness and advocate for combating GBV and IPV. If I am elected as the new MPP for Lanark-Frontenac-Kingston, you can be sure of my steadfast support for such efforts.

Karen McCrimmon: I would agree that intimate partner violence is at epidemic levels. The Ontario Liberal caucus supported Bill 173. The Ford government's cynical sidelining of it in committee is deplorable. That he is concerned more with fighting auto theft than saving women's lives is testament to how little he values women and this issue. Gender-based violence is also unacceptable in a country that prides itself on its human rights record.

I support meaningful investments into violence prevention, early intervention, and survivor support services. It is terrifying the degree to which our rights are being taken away all around the world. During my service in the Royal Canadian Air Force I participated in a number of humanitarian missions. I have seen first-hand how much women and children suffer in conflict zones and under oppressive regimes.

Brandon Bay: If elected, I will fight to protect our communities in Ontario, which certainly must include a focus on reducing Gender-Based Violence and Intimate Partner Violence. [...] I recognize that the implementation of these measures is more important than ever, in the face of economic and cultural turmoil exacerbated by Trump's tariffs. I will work to make sure that women in Ontario are adequately protected, and make this an immediate priority when elected.

Lucille Collard:

International Women's Day Breakfast – Thursday 6 March

Elspeth attended Councillor Curry's breakfast with guest speaker, Kelly Daize, Executive Director of the Kanata North Business Association. Elspeth also met Councillor Glen Gower, Marianne Wilkinson, President, National Council of Women of Canada and Karen McCrimmon, MPP for Kanata-Carleton.



Webinar – Housing Security for Women Fleeing Violence: The Effectiveness of Transitional (Second-Stage) Shelters, Max Bell School of Public Policy, McGill U

Hot off the press! I just attended this webinar presented by the Collectif québécois pour la prévention de l'itinérance (CQPI)/Homelessness Prevention Policy Collaborative (QHPPC). The webinar discussed the results of a 2024 study in Quebec examining the role and effectiveness of second-stage shelters for victims of domestic and intimate partner violence as a strategy for preventing homelessness.



Speakers were Melissa Shemirani, BSc, MSc candidate, McBurney Fellow; Pearl Eliadis, Associate Professor (professional) Max Bell School of Public Policy, Co-chair of the Gender Research Stream of the QHPPC; Melpa Kamateros, Shield of Athena Family Services and Claudine Thibaudeau, SOS Violence Conjugale.

The effectiveness of transitional (second-step or second-stage) shelters for women fleeing violence is poorly understood and has been the subject of few comprehensive studies. Melissa researched first- and second-stage shelters to assess their relative effectiveness in helping women escape domestic violence and achieve stable housing. The research synthesises existing literature and incorporates input from a reference group of experts and survivors who

provide their experiences and real-time information about the functioning of shelters in Québec. Preliminary results point to key factors such as the overuse of primary shelters because of the deficit of second-stage shelters, as well as length of stay and services provided. The review highlights significant gaps in the current research, particularly regarding long-term outcomes after leaving second-stage shelters, and advocates for increased funding and capacity for second-stage housing.

Both first- and second-stage shelters are lumped in with social housing in Québec, meaning that funding standards do not comply with shelters' needs in terms of security and services. Shelter builds fall far behind the Quebec government's promises in 2021. Mme Thibaudeau told us that if you have a sister, cousin, aunt who needs to flee an abusive situation, no spaces are available in Montreal nor in surrounding suburbs such as Laval.

Since the discussion concerned Montréal and Québec, some speakers spoke in English and others in French, but interpretation was provided.
